PROGRAMMES

AGEWELL - HELPLINE FOR OLDER PERSONS

Agewell Foundation aims to disabuse the popular mindset that regards old age with a sense of pity for their helplessness. Replacing it with an attitude of confidence, fostering respect for them and encouraging fortitude in them and bringing a little certainty, even fun into their lives.

With this purpose in mind, Agewell-Helpline was set up for Older Persons. A network of thousands of volunteers is already at work in given areas. They are constantly alert to

attend, to matters of medical or emotional nature, affairs to do with security as well as legal and financial advice. They are spread across 718 districts of India so that no cry for help goes unanswered. Agewell Helpline for Older Persons endeavours to bring about a change in the perceptions about old age. It has been set up with the sole objective of providing assistance to older persons and helping them find solutions for their problems.

Objective and methodology of the Agewell Helpline:

- Helpline counters to identify and assist the needy. Understand their specific requirements, immediate as well as in long term.
- Assist them in identifying and availing best possible offerings as per their needs from all other voluntary organizations, NGOs, Govt. bodies and international organizations.
- Counsel them. Help them re-build themselves. Rekindle the self-confidence.
- Assess impact of disaster on individual life and families.
- Organism counseling and community participation activities
- Agewell Helpline for Older Persons also works as a bridge between the assistance seekers and the assistance providers.



AGEWELL - RESEARCH & ADVOCACY CENTRE (FOR NEEDS & RIGHTS OF OLDER PERSONS)

The Agewell Centre for Ageing is committed to bringing in a dynamic change for the Older Persons in terms of social participation & integration, economic security, macro societal change and development, healthy ageing, enhancing the physical and mental quality of life and ushering in care systems in diverse cultural, socio-economic and environmental situations.

The research agenda includes - studies in policy related areas of ageing where the findings may have practical and realistic application. Agewell undertakes advocacy on issues of concern for welfare of elderly with the government, national and international agencies, elected representatives e.g. parliamentarians, bureaucrats, political parties, business, industry and other structures of power & media at all levels.

During the year under report, two study reports were published by Agewell Foundation.


ACCESS TO JUSTICE IN INDIA FOR OLD PEOPLE With special focus on RIGHT TO WORK, March 2020

Research & Advocacy Centre at Agewell Foundation has recently carried out a nationwide survey to study the status of access to justice in old age and availability of legal judicial system in the country for old people.

Simultaneously, under the survey, while assessing the access to justice in old age, right to work of older persons and their access to country's labor market were also studied. It was also attempted to identify core areas of concerns in the field of legal system for safeguarding interests and rights of older persons. In view of changed socio-economic and

In view of changed socio-economic and demographic scenario, study was also focused to suggest and recommend some specific measures to policy makers, planners and decision makers so that access to justice could be ensured for old people in the country

For the survey a representative sample of 5000 older persons (2464 older men and 2536 older women) was interviewed spread across 100 districts of 20 states & Union Territories of India. Volunteers visited various public / community places including court complexes (various courts/ Lok Adalats (local public courts)/ Consumer courts) spread across the country.

Major Findings Of The Study

Need of legal protection in old age

- During the study it was found that 33.88% elderly respondents (i.e. 1694 elderly respondents out of 5000 sample respondents) felt the need in old age. Among them 44.4% were older men and remaining 23.5% were older women.
- 70.1% respondents (i.e. 1188 elderly) were from urban areas, while 29.9% elderly (i.e. 506 older persons) were from rural areas.





- In rural areas, 21.5% elderly respondents (26.2% older men & 16.6% older women) said that they felt the need of justice in their old age and in urban areas.
- When asked about whether old people in need of justice take any step to get justice in old age, it was found that only 1/6th elderly had taken any step for getting justice in old age.





• 86% elderly people, suffering from some kind of injustice in old age (1457 out of 1694 elderly respondents), never opted to take action against injustice and prefer to not to file any legal case or seek legal action against the culprits.

Challenges before older persons in getting access to justice

• 2/5th older persons (40.6%), who have not filed any complaint again the injustice said that lengthy legal process in the country is the primary reason for not going ahead with legal cases/complaints.

Awareness about the elderly friendly Legal provisions among old people

- During the survey 43.5% respondents reportedly accepted that being old persons, they are not at all aware of their specific legal rights.
- Among older men just above 1/3rd respondents i.e. 35.5% and among older women 51.6% respondents claimed that they have no knowledge of their specific legal rights.
- During the survey, it was found that almost every 10th elderly person (9.1%) is aware of RTI Act 2005.

Attitude of Older Persons towards Judicial system

• Under the survey, it was also attempted to observe the overall attitude of older persons towards current judicial system of the country. From the data obtained from 5000 sample elderly


respondents, it was found that in the country less than $1/3^{rd}$ elderly people (32.8%) are happy with the current judicial system.

Kinds of Primary legal cases of older people

- According to legal practitioners, contacted during the survey 37.2% cases of older persons were related to real estate (house/land properties).
- Data analysis showed that more than a half respondents (58.8% respondents with legal background) disagreed with this fact.

Most favorable legal provisions

• 10.2% legal practitioners were of the view that Hindu Adoptions and Maintenance Act, 1956 is the most favorable Act for older persons.



Right To Work And Access To The Labor Market

- On the analysis of data obtained from older persons, it was found that 12.9% respondents (14% in urban areas and 11.7% in rural areas) were working/gainfully engaged.
- Among older persons who are not gainfully engaged, almost every second person accepted that he/she need some work in old age. 51.4% (52.4% in urban areas and 50.3% in rural areas) said that they are in need of some gainful engagement / work due to various reasons.
- Among those 2239 older persons, 76.2% respondents were in the age group of 60-69 years, while 20.1% were in 70-79 years age group and remaining i.e. 3.7% were 80+.
- Study further suggested that most old persons (42.6%) wanted to work for financial self-reliance in old age.
- 21.7% respondents (486 out of 2239) said that they want to keep themselves engaged in order to attain good health.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Access to justice is a fundamental right for every citizen of India; however people in their old age have limited access to legal justice due to various factors like increased marginalization & isolation in old age, vulnerability and infirmity, etc.

For older persons in the age group of 60-70 years government and concerned stakeholders need to relook at their needs & rights because they have enormous pool of experience, knowledge and wisdom. To ensure justice for every older person, government must focus on community sensitization by creating awareness about specific needs and rights of older persons among their family members & caregivers in particular and in society in general.

Study also concludes that special focus must be given on welfare & empowerment of older persons and their working younger children must be held accountable to certain extent. For this some legal provisions can be made in laws like Maintenance and welfare of Parents and Senior Citizens Act etc.

To ensure access to justice for older people following steps are recommended;

- Arrangement of care givers for bedridden, disabled, infirm elderly
- Provision for safety & security of their property and life
- Regular patrolling by police / volunteers
- Provision for counseling to elderly living alone through volunteers
- Home delivery of foods / medicines, utility services
- Old age healthcare / hygiene training
- Skill training for self-reliance in old age
- Provision for palliative care, where ever required

To protect the right to work in old age and increase access of older persons to labor market, following measures are recommended:

SHARE THE WARMTH CAMPAIGN: A WINTER INITIATIVE



Agewell Foundation conducted "Share the Warmth" campaign to ensure no needy & destitute old person is deprived of warmth in Delhi-NCR during the year. Agewell has been conducting this campaign since 2010. Earlier it was known as "Spread the Warmth" Campaign.

During the year 2019-20 the campaign was conducted from November 2020 to February 2020. Agewell conducted the process of mobilizing donation & collection of old/used woolens from across Delhi & NCR & distribution of woolens amongst poor & needy older persons.

Agewell Foundation set up Collection Points at prominent

locations, posh colonies, Clubs, Residents Welfare Associations, Corporate offices as well as selected schools (while sensitizing the younger generation towards their responsibilities towards senior citizens) across Delhi NCR. Hundreds of Agewell volunteers spread across Delhi & NCR dedicated their time & efforts to make this initiative a great success.

Under the campaign over 1.80lac pieces of woollens, etc collected and distributed amongst over 90,000 destitute and older people through distributions camps set up by volunteers across Delhi-NCR.

Major supporters to the campaign were Rotary Southend Club, Blessings Clinic, HPCL, GAIL India, India Habitat Centre, IMT Ghaziabad, FIIB, NCU, Lokayata Art Gallary, Woolmark, Max India Foundation, Olive Bar & Kitchen, etc.



HEALTHCARE EQUIPMENT DISTRIBUTION AMONG DESTITUTE ELDERLY (Slums of Delhi & NCR)

Agewell Foundation has been conducting healthcare equipment distribution campaigns to provide medical accessories to destitute elderly in Slums of Delhi & NCR for 8 years. During the year under review, Agewell volunteers identified over 15500 destitute & elderly as

prospective beneficiary under the project.

Agewell volunteers organized camps in various localities as per the convenience of the beneficiaries in coordination with local volunteers and distributed free healthcare equipment to destitute elderly.

Healthcare equipment distributed among the needy persons - Wheelchairs / Walkers / Walking sticks / Adult Diapers / etc.

Agewell Foundation has distributed over 3175 Wheelchairs, 6100+ Walkers, 185000+ Adult Diapers and other relief material among destitute elderly across Delhi/NCR under Free Healthcare Equipment Distribution Camps during the year 2019-20.





Distribution of Wheelchairs and Adult Diapers among destitute elderly campaign was also supported by various PSUs and corporates like Oil & Natural Gas Corporation, Mercer Consulting, Ferolite Jointings, Hilite Industries, Omax Auto, Oiles India, GAIL India, Canara HSBC OBC Life Insurance, Benevity, Adobe, etc.

FREE FOOD PACKETS DISTRIBUTI ON AMONG DESTITUTE ELDERLY (In Slums of Delhi & NCR)

Agewell Foundation has initiated Free Food Packets Distribution campaign to provide food ration to destitute elderly in Slums of Delhi & NCR. During the year under review, Agewell

volunteers identified over 4500 destitute & elderly as prospective beneficiary under the project. Agewell volunteers organized camps in various localities as per the convenience of the beneficiaries in coordination with local volunteers and distributed free food packets (containing Rice, Pulses, Edible Oil, Sugar, Masale, Tea, etc.) to destitute older persons living in BPL (below poverty line) families.

Agewell Foundation has distributed over 3240 Food Ration Packets Food packets among destitute elderly across Delhi/NCR under the project during the year 2019-20.

Free Food Packets Distribution campaign was supported by various PSUs and corporates like, Canara HSBC OBC Life Insurance Co., Mercer Consulting, Oiles India, Mission of Mercy Foundation, Sohan Lal Commodity, Adobe, etc.



AGEWELL EMPLOYMENT EXCHANGE FOR OLDER PERSPMS

It is an Intergenerational Initiative, as a gainful engagement for retired old persons to provide community involvement and to pursue opportunities for complete development of their potential. Under the project the Foundation has also implemented Home Tutors & Easy

Accounts scheme (Eklavya) in Delhi.

Agewell Employment Exchange for Older Persons had received over 2690 calls/visits from older persons during the year 2019-20. Responses received from older persons were further categorised as per the following;



DIGITAL LITERACY PROGRAM FOR OLDER PERSONS (In Delhi & NCR)

With increasing role of modern communication and information technology in day-to-day's life, digitally illiterates (particularly 55+) find themselves totally lost and find it difficult to

remain in mainstream. In view of gravity of the situation, there is an urgent need to bridge the knowledge and intergenerational gap in the society.

Agewell Foundation has been conducting Digital Literacy Program for Old People since April 2017 in Delhi-NCR to empower them and make them computer literate, so that they can adjust themselves in modern life and fast paced lead а more comfortable and respectable life in old age. The program is bringing a qualitative change in the lives of elderly and helping in bridging the generation gap and bringing generations together.

The program was sponsored by Oracle during the year 2019-20. So far over 24200 digitally illiterate older persons have been benefitted under the program.

AGEWELL SQULOR TO SCHOLOR PROJECT (For **Supporting School Education Of Children Living In Slums)**

During the year 2017-18, Agewell Foundation has continued Agewell Squalor to Scholar Project with the objective to support school education of children belonging to poor families living in slum clusters of Faridabad in the state of Haryana with support from Squalor to Scholar Inc., USA.

Under the project the Foundation is supporting expenses like school fees, uniforms, books and stationery, tuition, transportation expenses, medicines, etc. of children from disadvantaged families. The program is being monitored and coordinated by experienced and retired older persons.

Under the project 170+ children have been supported so far.



AGEWELL FAMILY MEMBERSHIP DRIVE (For Older Persons)

Agewell Family Membership Scheme aims at providing family support to those Older Persons, who are living alone in Delhi. The Foundation has a team of trained counsellors.

Trained counsellors of Agewell Foundation provide following services as and when required by Agewell Family Members;

- · A companion who will spend time with them, heal the loneliness as they grow even older
- Medical support in the form of consultations, medicines and people on whom they can depend in case of an emergency
- Someone who will look after their security concerns and protect their property
- Expert guidance in legal and financial matters



 General assistance such as paying their bills on time, being their escort & taking care of their chores

Agewell Foundation has a local network of volunteers / social workers from all walks of the life. The network provides its services to older persons in and

Delhi. Agewell volunteers are available for counselli services for general, medical, legal and financia problems; for interaction with Older Persons; for companionship for Older Persons, living alone. Volunteers registered with Agewell include well-educated people, retired persons, working people, social workers, college students etc.
